Fr David writes...

The great twentieth century Dutch spiritual writer, Henri Nouwen's most famous book is called "The Wounded Healer". In it, the author explains that the Healer is the one who is in touch with his/her own wounds first. Real healers are those who have a deep sense of their own struggles and uses their own wounds as resources for connecting them on a deeper level with others. The most fascinating people we can meet, are those who did not have an easy life. We love reading biographies of people who inspire us by their ability to not only survive through sometimes horrendous upbringing or situations but excel through them. Their stories have almost always a redemptive element in them. Their tragic stories instead of disempowering them and making them feel small, made them larger than life and more authentic because of their way of dealing with them. Prophets are people like Nouwen or St Paul, who understood that their "thorn in the flesh" was not there to humiliate them but that they would rely always not on their own "perfection" but on the grace of God in their life. The thorn in the flesh whatever it is, can be a channel of transformation for us and a means of connection with other mortal human beings like us. Nouwen's deep sense of restlessness in his life was fuelled by a sense of rejection he experienced in his childhood, especially by his father. This created in him a yearning for intimacy and acceptance by others. This much loved and famous writer who had inspired not only thousands of people of his own generation but future ones, lacked a sense of belonging all through his life.

His books were a kind of insightful reflection on his existential reality and because he wrote so authentically about his experience, touched so many people through his books. People like myself could connect and identify with his writings and his articulation had helped me to put words on my own personal experience. I felt I knew Henri Nouwen personally and it felt that he knew me. That is the power of authentic Prophets. Rejection in whatever age we experience it, can damage us for life. As human beings, especially as children, we yearn to fit in. We identify our own worth in our ability or inability, to belong to a group. Our deepest fear is rejection especially by our parents or primary carers. This kind of wound can harm our self- confidence like none other. Rejection touches the deepest core of our being.

In today's gospel, Jesus returns to his home place of Nazareth. When Jesus teaches in the local synagogue, many of his townspeople are astonished by his performance. They start to wonder and question the origin of his teachings and the nature of his wisdom, as well as the miracles that are done through him. When Jesus was at home, working as a carpenter with his family, there was no problem in accepting him. However now, seeing him as a Wise Prophet, they find it difficult to accept him as he now is threatening their status quo. The neighbours find it easier having a carpenter amongst them than a prophet. So they try to undermine him by referring to his family tree. They want to put him back in a small box. The job Jesus worked, his mother, the presence of his sisters. In their own way they are saying "Who does he think he is? We know his background. We know where he is coming from". They want to cut a tall poppy down to size. Whatever their wonder, they are not going to allow Jesus's wisdom to interfere with their memories of him. Jesus then tells them – "A prophet is only despised in his own country, among his own relations and in his own house". The evangelist Mark has already told us that his relations believe that he is out of his mind. Now the rejection seems to be complete. Jesus's experience of rejection in Nazareth renders him powerless to do any miracles among his own people. This is an extraordinary statement about the human Jesus. People's lack of trust limits his ministry. Distrust disables him. So he moves elsewhere, refusing to be enslaved by his failure to reach his own people. And he never returns to Nazareth again.

We flourish where we feel trusted. If we are around people who doubt our abilities or do not believe in our judgements and skills, we feel disabled. We cannot perform well if we are always being asked questions

to justify ourselves. The prophet needs space to be himself or herself in order to give to others their utmost potential. Like Jesus, if we ever find ourselves in such an environment of distrust and rejection, it is better to move on and find a place where we feel a sense of belonging in. If we keep on persevering in negative toxic situations, we could become physically and mentally sick and very resentful in vain. In these situations, like Jesus we need to be humble enough to say, we are getting nowhere here. It would be better to invest our energies somewhere else where others can benefit. These are always moments of serious discernment. These decisions are not made haphazardly but with utmost sensitivity and wisdom. I would like to bring to God this week all those who have felt or are feeling rejected by those who are close to them or in their professions. May the gift of healing and wisdom lead you to make the right decisions and choices. Blessings on your journey of discernment.
