Second Collection

This weekend, the second collection will be for our Parish maintenance fund.

Fr David writes

Ahmed Joudah, a twenty six year old ballet dancer from Yarmouk camp in Damascus, said that it was not easy to achieve his dream. He had major disagreements with his father over it. However, he insisted on achieving it and he continued his education in theatre and danced at the Higher Institute of Dramatic Arts in Damascus. During the war, Joudah was teaching the children in the camp dancing and ballet, however he received death threats from ISIS. Joudah went out of Yarmouk with his mother, because of the painful siege imposed on the camp in 2012. He lived near the camp, leaving his memories in the streets of Yarmouk, where he was dancing amidst its lanes. In 2014, Ahmed was invited to join the Arabic version of "So you think you can Dance" in Lebanon, he was fortunate to reach the semi-finals. But then he was told that he would not be able to win because he was a Palestinian-Syrian, which came as a shock to him. He did not lose hope and returned to Damascus to complete his education at the Higher Institute where he was asked to design a series of dances for dance festivals in the Syrian Opera House.

Joudah's story attracted the attention of a Dutch journalist who went to Damascus to shoot a documentary about him in 2016. Ahmed appeared in front of the camera dancing on the ruins of his home in Yarmouk refugee camp. That was what he wished for. He also went to Palmyra with the Dutch journalist to film him dancing on the old Roman Theatre, the site that witnessed the mass executions carried out by ISIS against the civilians in Palmyra. "Dancing at the Palmyra Theatre was my way in defying ISIS. I told them you could take our lives, but you would not stop us from dancing. This theatre was made for art and not for murder," said Ahmed. After showing the documentary in the Netherlands, it attracted the attention of many dancing schools in Europe. The Dutch National Ballet's director decided to create a fund called "Dancing for Peace" to enable Joudah to go to the Netherlands to dance and study. He is currently completing his studies at the University of Amsterdam and works as a dancer in the Dutch National Ballet, in addition to his work as a dance instructor at a ballet school in Amsterdam.

There is nothing quite so puzzling as someone else's joy when we are feeling down. Or someone else's sadness while we are feeling on top of the world. The ultimate puzzle though is when people are joyful in the midst of suffering and desolation, when people dance among the ruins that surround them, refusing to be locked into an environment of despair. When I saw the documentary of Ahmed on social media last year, I was truly blown away by his determination and inner freedom in the midst of adversity. I saw courage and passion in his eyes. I found his story very moving and inspirational. Like Zephaniah the prophet in the first reading, calling through the slums of a defeated Jerusalem for a grand party to celebrate the real fortune of the people. Like St Paul in the second reading, a prisoner in a cell awaiting his approaching death and writing letters to cheer other people up. Like John the Baptist in the gospel today, a wilderness voice in occupied territory announcing Good News to his own country people.

What was the reason for this joy in the midst of persecution and despair? What is it that keeps us as humans joyful in the midst of suffering? Zephaniah, Paul and John the Baptist shared one belief: that the Lord was very near. God's nearness didn't act as a threat to them but funded them with a radical source of joy that no one could steal from them. Not even the executioner. Their joy in the closeness of God gave an edge to their preaching exhorting others to make ready. It gave them a vision to see the far side of disaster. It moved them to draw others into that sense of joy. None of them was enclosed in his own joy. Each moved out hoping his inner joy would be catching.

People journeyed into the wilderness to meet and hear John because he was a magnetic character who intrigued people to seek him out and also follow him. People asked him "What must we do then?" and John's answer is to challenge people's generosity and sense of fairness so that others may have reason to rejoice. Give bread to the hungry and clothes to those who have none. When the tax collectors ask what to do, John tells them to keep to the going rate without overtaxing people in order to cream off the extra money for themselves. People are burdened enough. Be just he told them. To the soldiers he said not to use their position as a weapon for their own reward. Be content with your pay and stop stealing from the poor and weak. John exhorts them to be happy in doing what is just.

We all need a power that carries us through difficult times, that prods us on when we face the reality of our weakness and limitation. To believe in the abiding presence of a God who cares and gives us a deep sense of joy in the midst of our own grappling in life. As we continue our Advent journey, we are invited to reflect on our times of disorientation and pain. Do we collapse and become resentful? What are the resources which keeps us going through? Does the realisation that God is with us sustains us along the way?
